Grow Up Reading™ Tips for July: Talking & Singing

- Talk to your infant. As you gaze at your child and have a "conversation," your baby will respond, smile and "talk" to you. This is how children begin to understand language.
- Vary the pitch of your voice to get your child's attention while you are talking.
- Teach your children nursery rhymes, which will help them learn about language and later learn to read. When singing nursery rhymes, we naturally speak more clearly and slowly, which is a good way for children to hear the sounds that make up words.



"Did you ever see a dragon pulling a wagon?" Down by the bay

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
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ONLINE LIBRARY
