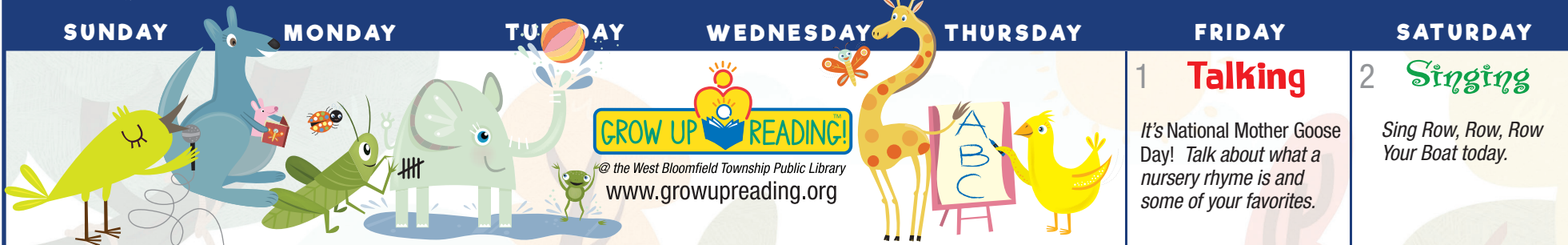

Check out and read a book about another state or country.</i></p>

Count the number of red cars you see today.</i></p>	<p>12 Playing</p> <p><i>Play a game of "I Spy" and look for things that start with the letter "M".</i></p>	<p>13 Talking</p> <p><i>Share one thing that made you happy today.</i></p>	<p>14 Singing</p> <p><i>Take turns singing all of the nursery rhymes you know together.</i></p>	<p>15 Reading</p> <p><i>Read a book about flowers or plants.</i></p>	<p>16 Writing</p> <p><i>Draw a spring picture with crayons and markers.</i></p>
<p>17 Counting</p> <p><i>Visit the Library to learn about dinosaur bones with Paleo Joe! Can you help him count how many bones he's found?</i></p>	<p>18 Playing</p> <p><i>Pretend to be a butterfly, a spider, a worm and a bee. How do you move for each one?</i></p>	<p>19 Talking</p> <p><i>Talk about sunshine. What do you like to do on a sunny day?</i></p>	<p>20 Singing</p> <p><i>Sing your favorite song together and make up silly lyrics.</i></p>	<p>21 Reading</p> <p><i>Look at the cover of a book and guess what it's about together. After reading it talk about how you were right or wrong.</i></p>	<p>22 Writing</p> <p><i>Use Q-tips and paint or stamp pads to create your own art bugs.</i></p>	<p>23 Counting</p> <p><i>At the store count the number of items you purchase.</i></p>

Grow Up Reading™ Tips for May: Talking

- It's important to talk about feelings with your child. Help your child to figure out ways to express their feelings safely and make sure to label their feelings as they happen.
- When you teach your child nursery rhymes, you are contributing to their creative development. When you talk to your child from the moment they are born, through to their years of learning how to talk, you are equipping them with a solid vocabulary base.
- Children also learn to understand abstract concepts like big, small, in front, behind, first and last through talk. The words used in nursery rhymes help children develop language comprehension by associating words with people, objects, and events in their daily life.
